

ASEAN-OSPAR* Preparatory Meeting for Information Network

he ASEAN-OSPAR Preparatory Meeting for Information Network was held from Feb. 6-7 2003 at The Oriental Singapore under the chairmanship of Mr. Tadashi Shimura, Managing Director of Nippon Maritime Center Ltd. and General Manager of Singapore Representative Office, the Japan Association of Marine Safety. Delegates from member countries Brunei Darussalam, Indonesia, Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore and Thailand, and observers from Cambodia, Myanmar and Vietnam attended the meeting. An expert each from the Japan Coast Guard (JCG) and the Japan Association of Marine Safety also attended.

Capt. Myo Thant, one of WMU Sasakawa Fellows (MSEP 1999), was present as an observer from Myanmar. He currently works with the Department of Marine Administration, Ministry of Transport as Deputy Director of Nautical Div.

Mr. Loeung Simona, an observer from Cambodia, is one of the WMU graduates (SM 2002).

The meeting revised and agreed to the draft proposal on the information network, which will be submitted to the 2nd ASEAN-OSPAR Management Meeting for approval, the summary of which is as follows:

The information network consists of three elements, i.e. homepage linkage, e-mail exchange and human network. The homepage linkage is set up for basic information exchange, e-mail is used for routine information exchange with particular member countries and sometimes used for urgent information exchange in case of incidents. As for the human network, it comprises of a contact person (CP) from each member country, who is responsible for information exchange through the aforementioned homepage linkage and e-mail.

ASEAN-OSPAR project was established under the member countries' recognition of the necessity and significance of further cooperation among member countries in responding appropriately and promptly to oil & HNS (Hazardous and Noxious Substances) spill incidents. In line with such recognition, Japan has come up with a new proposal for the establishment of an information network, which would assist in managing the flow of information as well as promoting the activities of the project.

Mr. Hernandez was one of two Filipino officials invited this time.

The training contained lectures on Administration and techniques of ship safety inspection in Japan, basics of stability, structure/strength, engine/electric parts, etc., and field studies in factories, local Maritime Bureaus, shipyards and so on. They also visited the Ministry of Land, Infrastructure and Transport and exchanged information and opinions.

Impact of SARS on Chinese seafarers

n recent months, a new contagion, SARS, has been found in many places in China especially in Guangdong, Hong Kong and Beijing, as well as in other countries. Chinese seafarers are suffering from its impact. Some manning companies have lost contracts to send crews to ships after old contracts expired. A small company said that it has not sent seafarers for two months. However, many manning companies are taking precautions to prevent their crews from getting SARS, using methods such as to quarantine a team of seafarers in a hotel for two weeks before they are dispatched. It increases the cost, but makes employers confident of SARS prevention on their ships. On the other side, the transit of the seafarers is also affected by SARS, with at least one country refusing to transit Chinese seafarers once. Some Chinese seafarers have not been allowed shore leave when the ships arrived in some ports, even though the ships have not been in China for half a year. As a manpower supplying country for the international maritime industry, manning companies and Chinese seafarers are very concerned about the health of seafarers. They are taking measures to eradicate SARS from their business, and to reduce its negative impact. They hope this tough period will be over very soon.

Mr. Yan Risuandi (MSA 1990) paid a visit to Mr. Sasakawa at The Nippon Foundation in the afternoon on Apr. 24, 2003 and exchanged information.

Mr. Risuandi is an official of the Ministry of Communications and came to Japan in March of this year to undertake the responsibility of Transportation Attaché at the Indonesian Embassy in Tokyo.

Mr. Sasakawa said that Indonesia and The Nippon Foundation have been keeping close contact with each other for a long time. It has been about 30 years since the project for the elimination of leprosy started. He also said that with much of the Malacca and Singapore Straits in its territory, Indonesia has a very important role in marine safety. In order to support the elimination of marine casualties in this area, The Nippon Foundation has decided to donate a buoy tender to Indonesia, which is now under construction in Japan and expected to be delivered this coming autumn. A donation ceremony is scheduled to be held in Indonesia.

Mr. Yan Risuandi expressed his gratitude to The Nippon Foundation for its varied and gracious support given to Indonesia. He also commented that Indonesia is now improving maritime issues in both hard/software, especially in the training and education of sea personnel to comply with the high quality of international demand. He also said that WMU Sasakawa Fellows' Network will be quite useful to resolve international maritime problems.

Editors' Postscript


I thank the Fellows for their contributions, which have enabled us to issue the newsletters so smoothly, from the 1st issue in October 2002 to this 3rd edition.
